We emphasize serving people with developmental disabilities. Local clubs are supported by Civitan International, which was organized in 1917 and spans over 24 countries. The word CIVITAN is a coined word that comes from Latin word "CIVITAS", which means

We have several meetings coming up with speakers you DO NOT want to miss. In fact, they promise to be so good we are inviting other clubs to visit and our own members to bring guests (and potential members) who may be interested.



The first is Willie Ruff. Willie is a co-founder of the Handy Festival, a well known musician himself, and has just retired from Yale as a professor and researcher of music. He has co-created the PBS documentary "A Conjoining of Ancient Song", which focuses on a rapidly vanishing form of congregational singing that is shared by Scottish,

African Americans, and Native Americans - even here in the Shoals. He has a place on Wikipedia - look him up for a LOT more information. He will be speaking on September 26.



The second is Tim Ezell, Division Chief for Marshall Space Flight Center's Space System Department. The title of his talk is *Muscle Shoals*, *Marshall Space Flight Center and Mars*. Through his talk, he wants to connect the Shoals which is home to many folks who work at Redstone along with a diverse collage of stuff which has found a home there over the last century. From the music industry to high tech industries including Reynolds, Ford, TVA, Dams, Hydroelectric Plants, Nuclear Plants, Rockets, Helicopters, Moon Shots, etc., there is a mystery to many

and, while there are incredibly complex disciplines involved, it's mixed with a lot of just innate human creativity. Some of the old timers at Marshall grew up on farms playing basketball and called some of what they did in the 60's during the Saturn Project "tractor ingenuity" - perhaps modest but with some truth sprinkled in. He will be speaking on October 17.

Book Nook

Read an exeptional book lately? Share it with the rest of us - write a short book review for our newsletter.

If you are looking for a good book to finish off the summer, I have one for you which is the best I have read in the last five or ten years. I'm sure you have heard about Pealr Harbor from day one in about evey iteration possible. But how much have you heard about what was ahppening in the Phillipines other than McCarthu's well known "I shall return". *Industructible* by John R. Bruning (available at Sam's and Books-A-Million) tells the true story of an American living with his family in the Phillipines at the time Pearl Harbor is bombed. He was a retired Navy flyer and a

co-founder of Phillipe Airlines. As Pearl Harbor was bombed, he and his family faced the prospect not just of bombing but invasion and were well aware of the atrocities committed by Japanese troops in China. The lives of his family in Japanese occupied Manila and his significant contributions to winning the war in the Western Pacific are told in gripping fashion. This is their true story - but don't plan to read this over a very long period of time. You will find this is not a book you lay aside easily.

GOOD TO KNOW

From RealAge (http://www.realage.com) comes the following advice on how to care for our brains and lesson the odds of contracting the heart breaking disease, Alzheimer's.

- 1. Eat more salads, fish, and fruit. Eat less butter, ice cream, and red meat. And don't just say, "Yeah, okay, tomorrow." DO it!
- 2. Fit in 30 minutes of brisk walking daily no matter what. Combine walking with a healthy diet and you'll cut chances of Type 2 Diabetes which presages Alzheimer's in many individuals.
- 3. Do. Not. Smoke. And do not go near people who do.
- 4. Drink coffee. Three to five small cups per day could lower your risk.
- 5. Know when to say no to alcohol. One drink per day for women, two for men MAY help protect your brain and heart. BUT, once even mild cognitive problems occur, even a few drinks per week can double dementia risk.
- 6. Pop our favorite supplement. People who take 900 milligrams a day of DHA for just six months see their brain become as much as 3 years younger.

Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Shoals is embarking on a new initiative called "Bigs with Badges!" We are actively recruiting police officers from local city jurisdictions plus sheriff's deputies from 3 counties to



serve as volunteer mentors to our unmatched Littles. The officers will have the option to choose Community Based or School Based mentoring. We plan to target children on our waiting list as well as in our service delivery area who have a negative connotation of law enforcement officials; have close relatives who are or have been incarcerated; or have been adjudicated themselves.

Lauderdale County Sheriff, Rick Singleton, is a former Big Brother with our program. He states that he absolutely supports the concept of law enforcement officers becoming role models to our Littles. Colbert County Sheriff, Frank Williamson, has served as a Celebrity Waiter during one of our fundraising events and when approached about this project, he stated that BBBS is a worthy cause and that Bigs with Badges is a great idea! He hopes it will help children have a better sense of well being by knowing they have a friend who is a police officer. The overall goal of the project is to improve community relations between our local police and at-risk children while providing these children with the positive role models that they need and want.
